He was chosen Lt. of the foot Co. of Salisbury 1658. In June he was discharged to military Co. of Amesbury. Received land in first division 1640-44. Was earlier at Ipswich. An original settler of Amesbury. Challis or chalice- a cup or bowl taken from the sign of a house or shop.

He came on the ship 'Lyon' with Roger Williams 1631, lived in Boston 2 years. Settled in Ipswich 1633; owned 'Perkins Island' in Ipswich River. Freeman 1631, one of committee to settle bounds between Roxbury and Dorchester 1632. Perkins- from Peir or Peter and the patronymic or diminutive termination 'ins' little Peter or son of Peter.

Wheeler- one who made wheels, from old English hweol(wheel).
