Cambridge, Mass. 1643; freeman 1645. Bought 500 acre farm at Cambridge Village. This farm commences near what is now the division line between Newton and Brighton, extended westward, including what is Newtonville. Deputy to G General Court 1647 and re elected for 17 years. Selectman Cambridge 1668; Comm. to lay out and settle highways. Accompanied Rev. John Eliot at his lectures to the Indians at Nonantum. Large proprietor in Billerica 1652; had 400 acres which he gave to Harvard College in his will. At his death he had 1600 acres of land; 2 men servants at \$5.00 each. Cambridge Village became Newton.

In Cambridge, Mass. Mar. 31, 1635/6. Resided on easterly side of North Ave. opposite the commons. Agreed to keep 100 cattle to be paid in corn and money. Freeman 1645, one of the incorporators of Billerica 1654 but did not move there.

Patton- identified the ancestor who made clog shoes. These were sandal-type made from wood with a high heel and leather straps. 'Pattons' probably were designed in a monastery for they were first worn by monks. Clog sandals enabled one's feet to keep dry when walking in mud or on wet ground. Old France 'Patene' clog shoe.
